## Ruby Murray — a national favourite almost overnight

IT IS 25 years since Irish colleen Ruby Murray achieved her biggest success with "Softly, Softly", but she is still a popular artist all over the world with her demure appearance and appealing voice.

Altogether she had ten hit songs, seven in one year (1955), with five in the charts at the same time, a year of the Hit Parade.
